For five days we were in the Thái Nguyên University where we helped Vietnamese English teachers learn classroom tools and help them with their pronunciations of English words, as well as clear up some cultural misconceptions. This was a HUGE deal, because this is the first professional teaching interaction ever staged with this university.

After warming up to us, the teachers began sharing some of the things they had learned about “foreigners” (Americans). They had been taught to never ask us questions about our personal lives, because Americans considered that rude and did not like to share personal information! After we cleared that up, we really had a good time. It was amazing learning about their personal lives, their love of teaching, and the local culture. Several of the girls traveled four hours a day to attend our class, and when they got home, they still had a family to take care of.

Teacher: I don't have any money either.


Kim: Why don't you have any money?
